**Notes from the Rector, Rectory, and Rev. Adele**

**Women's Gathering this Sunday at the Rectory!** Adele is excited to welcome the women of All Hallows to the Rectory at 109 W. Federal St. for food and fellowship on Sunday, May 6 from



5 to 7 p.m. This event also serves as an “*Open House*” for all to tour the newly renovated rectory, There will be a variety of “pick-up” food, desserts and drinks. There is no need for anyone to bring anything but yourselves! Let’s celebrate our community and the beginning of Spring!

**Men’s Baseball outing:** Sunday, May 6<sup>th</sup>. Join Bill Hatala and other parishioners in a matinee Shorebirds game. Meet at All Hallows at 1:10pm if you need a ride, or, meet at the stadium for the 2:05pm game. Contact Bill, who already has a group of tickets, at 410-713-9600.

**The Episcopal Church loves kids!** We are grateful to Bill Gordy, Keith Donoway and others who faithfully teach our children about God and our Lord during the Sunday School time. The children love Sunday School! You may have also noticed that the children sometimes participate in the processional before going to Sunday School. At the Peace, the children come into the church to join their families. For younger children, worship bags are being provided. Each bag contains a

small stuffed animal “prayer buddy” and a re-usable Bible story coloring pad with water pens. While we encourage parents to help their children participate in worship as they are able, the worship bags can aid our youngest ones as well as support the efforts of their parents in bringing them to church. Rev. Chuck also invites the children to walk down the aisle with him during the final hymn. We believe that all of these things communicate to our children that each of them is an important part of our parish family.

**Clergy Conference at Claggett Center.** Rev. Chuck and Rev. Adele will be participating in the annual clergy conference with clergy in the Diocese of Easton, which will be held at Claggett Center in Adamstown, MD from May 14-16. The featured retreat leader will be The Rev. Jay Sidebotham, Director of RenewalWorks, priest, artist and humorist. Sidebotham also serves as Associate Rector at St. James Parish in Wilmington, NC. The retreat will include plenary sessions as well as small group meetings. Following the conference, the Hatfields will be attending the Commencement at Virginia Theological Seminary on May 17, returning that evening.

**Pentecost is Sunday May 20<sup>th</sup>!** **RED** is the color of choice representing the Holy Spirit. Red hangings, stole, etc. Alice Tweedy and the Altar Guild will have everything done to beautify the church. Everyone should wear as much **RED** as they can. The bulletin will be stocked with hymns we love and are easy to sing. Preparations are being made now to make the service enjoyable, special, and spiritually uplifting. Do you have a positive encouraging suggestion or know of something to enhance the service? Let Rev. This is the time to show that All Hallows is a place for worship. Hope to see everyone there!

**A Worship and Music Committee to be formed:** Beginning this summer, there will be a Worship and Liturgical Music Committee formed. Its goal is to work to make the services flow, improve any and everything within the realm of the Sunday service (or any other service held other than 9:30a.m. Sunday) that makes us the Episcopal Church within the Diocese of Easton. The Rector, Chuck, is the head of the group and is looking for members. Jim Bosworth will be a member of the committee as the organist, and I am hopeful that former, current, and *future* choir members would be interested in being a part of the group.

**The Vestry voted to ...change vestry meeting dates for the rest of the year.** Vestry meets on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month – so May 22<sup>nd</sup>, June 26<sup>th</sup>, and so on. Potentially when a vestry retreat date is set in conjunction with the Diocesan goal of working with Appreciative Inquiry with Rev. Chuck and the vestry for the future, either the June or July vestry meeting date could change. Otherwise, the only month currently for the rest of 2018 that the vestry will not meet on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday is December (as it's Christmas Day!)

**Painting Project at Holy Cross in June.** From June 25-29, a group of 10 youth and adults from St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Mountain Lakes, NJ (the parish where together the Hatfields previously served as co-rectors) will be here to scrape and paint the sides and back of The Chapel of the Holy Cross, located in Stockton. Guided by Rev. Adele for the last six years in NJ, the youth have taken mission trips to other states to paint and repair homes where needed. They will be housed at the Rectory while in Snow Hill. The work at Holy Cross will begin on June 26. Adults and older youth from All Hallows are welcome to assist in this project. Each day's work will begin with a short worship service in the chapel. If you fully sign up, there's a series of safeguards for individuals (& families) to sign up so they can reload cards, like Acme or Food Lion – there **are** others, on the spot: An example: Harry's mom, Beth Anderson, told us she reloads her grocery card in the parking lot before going into the store to shop. Smart – not just her smart phone talking there! Rev. Chuck & Adele use their Sunoco or Shell gas (gift) cards that can be reloaded plus other ways that help our parish. It's the vendors who make the donation based on us, the shoppers, who make the purchases.

If you'd like a home visit to learn more and sign up (it's a 3-4 step process) – just let Rev. Chuck know. He's glad to make an appointment and come to show you how it works. Just ask!

### **Musings by Jim**

**from the archives of *The Democratic Messenger***

September 13, 1919 – WINS 1,000 Scholarship to Princeton University, awarded by Princeton Club to Alfred Dashiell. Mr. Alfred S. Dashiell, son of Mrs. E. S. Dashiell, of Snow Hill, has been awarded the 1919 scholarship of the Philadelphia Princeton Club to Princeton University. Mr. Dashiell attended the Snow Hill High School through the tenth grade, entered the Episcopal Academy, Philadelphia, in the fall of 1917. He completed the three years' course in two years, graduating last June with high honors.

His scholarly attainments and his qualifications for the scholarship attracted the notice of the scholarship committee, and he received the highest mark and the unanimous vote of the members for the scholarship. The scholarship is for \$1,000, one fourth of which will be available for each year of the University course.

Mr. Dashiell's friends feel very much gratified that he has received such flattering recognition, and knowing his capabilities, they predict more laurels and honors for him in his University career.

September 20, 1919 – Mr. Edward J. Dashiell, who has been at Ocean City for a few days, has returned home and is the guest of Rev. G. M. Galarneau at the Rectory. September 27, 1919 – Mr. Edward J. Dashiell left this week for Saranac, N.Y., where he will spend some time recuperating.

Camel cigarettes first advertised in the Democratic Messenger this date, also.

October 25, 1919 – FOR CLERK OF CIRCUIT COURT. Mr. Oliver D. Collins is marching on to a glorious victory. Everybody thinks it; everybody wants it; and most everybody says it. Mr. Collins was trained in the Clerk's Office. He never held or aspired to any other office. It is not everybody these days who can fill the office of a Clerk of the Circuit Court in an acceptable manner to the public as does Mr. Collins. He knows his business, and as a business proposition the people of Worcester County want Mr. Collins to remain in the Clerk's Office six more years. The day for turning down competent, trained public officials is passing. No longer are such positions given out to men because of "Political influence," or to satisfy a desire or cherished ambition, but the people want a real Clerk of the Court and in Mr. Collins they have what they want. From every imaginable quarter support is coming to him, Fall in! Make it unanimous.

November 1, 1919 – Mr. Collins Makes Clerk's Office Self-Supporting. In connection with the Clerk's office, there is one fact of interest to the taxpayers of the county, and which they should know, and that is, that

while for all purposes, it costs nearly six thousand dollars annually to run the office, yet for the last few years, comparatively little of this amount comes out of the taxpayers.

In 1917, the fees of that office were more than sufficient to pay all salaries and other expenses of the office, and nearly \$800 was, under the law, paid into the State Treasury. In 1918, the costs above receipts, of running the office, was for all purposes less than \$600, so that it will be seen that this, the most important office of the county, is almost self-sufficient, notwithstanding the fact that the greatly increased work of the office has necessitated greater clerical help and increased cost of blank books, stationery, etc. This condition is largely due to the economical conduct of the Clerk's office by Mr. Collins, whose experience is worth much to the taxpayers.

The ladies of St. Margaret's Guild, All Hallows Church, will give a minstrel show next Thursday evening, November 6<sup>th</sup> at the Opera House. Among the features of the entertainment will be songs, choruses, jokes (new), local hits (it may be you) and skits. If you don't go, you will miss one of the cleverest shows that has ever been presented in Snow Hill by local talent. There are two hours of fun making and enjoyment, and every minute is chuck full of color and action. Tickets are now on sale at Leland Richardson's store.

November 8, 1919 – William G. Kerbin elected State's Attorney. He was the People's Party favorite.

GIRL'S MINSTREL SHOW WAS A GREAT SUCCESS – Brigham Young and his beautiful Belles of Blackville breezed into Snow Hill this week, and delighted a large audience at the Opera House Thursday night. The entertainment was a Girls' Minstrel Show, given by local talent, the parts taken by young ladies, with the exception of the interlocutor, who through masquerading under the name of Brigham Young, the Mormon prophet, and possessor of many wives, was,

nevertheless, easily recognized as a young man of correct habits, and living “in a state of single blessedness.”

The “end men” and members of the chorus were ebonized to the queen’s taste, so that no little difficulty was experienced in penetrating their disguises.

The names of the belles were masterpieces of the punter’s art, for who but a juggler of words could contrive such funny combinations of names as Lene Genster, Shesa Bird, Lotta Talk, Vera Fuclose, and Augusta Wind! Then there were Hallie Butt, who was not a fish at all; Dinah Swayback, who though very, very sweet, wasn’t toasted brown to eat; Pussy Willow, soft as a pillow; Mary Pickford, just to tease and tickle Ford; Hazel Nut, brown with smut; Lily White on a Blacksville night, while Rosa Riggles, Kitty Kapers, and Dolly Dimples in such a delightful way, that, by Sweet Alyssum! Everyone would like to kiss um!

The program consisted of jokes, songs, choruses, duets, ballads and other pleasing features. Brigham called the figures and put the “belles” through their stunts at a very lively pace, giving the audience an evening of keen enjoyment and pleasure.

The show was given by the ladies of St. Margaret’s Guild of All Hallows Parish for the benefit of the Organ Fund.

November 15, 1919 – Rev. G. M. Galarneau, rector of All Hallows Parish, will preach a mission in Wye Parish, Wye Mills, beginning Sunday night, November 16<sup>th</sup>, and closing Sunday night, November 23<sup>rd</sup>.

**GIRLS MINSTREL SHOW HAS COME TO STAY.** The Girls’ Minstrel Show, which was presented at the Opera House on Thursday evening of last week, was so favorably received that the ladies of St. Margaret’s Guild, under whose auspices the show was given, have requests to repeat the performance, while invitations have also come from Pocomoke, Stockton, Berlin and Salisbury, for the minstrels to present the show in those towns. The management, however finds it impractical to repeat the performance, but the definite promise is made

that another minstrel show will be given next year – thus making the Girls' Minstrel Show an annual feature. It is also hoped to attain such a degree of excellence before the millennium rolls around, as will place the performance in the front rank of amateur theatricals.

The Ladies of St. Margaret's Guild wish to thank all who participated in the show, or otherwise contributed to its success for their hearty cooperation, and to express their appreciation to the public for their liberal patronage.

November 28, 1919 – Mr. William Howard Corddry is home for a few days visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William D. Corddry. Mr. Corddry is associated with a large contracting firm in Harrisburg, Pa., as a consulting engineer.

Hon. & Mrs. William D. Corddry returned home Wednesday from a visit to Philadelphia and Baltimore. While in Baltimore, Mr. Corddry visited the Bethlehem Steel Company's plant at Sparrows Point as the guest of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Eastern Shore Society of which he is a member. The visit to the plant was followed by an oyster roast at Rifle Range, the members of the Eastern Shore Society being the guests of the Bethlehem Steel Company.

November 29, 1919 – Does anyone remember "Union Suits"? They were available at M. T. Hargis & Co., Dry goods, Groceries, Furniture, Snow Hill, Md. For Christmas giving. If you have never worn Union Suits you certainly have been deprived of a great pleasure. Come here and let us show you the several kinds.

December 13, 1919 – Services will be held in All Hallows Church tonight (Friday, December 12<sup>th</sup>) at eight o'clock, to be followed by addresses by the prominent speakers from Baltimore on the subject of the nation-wide campaign, Everybody is invited to attend and learn of this, the most important movement in the history of the church.

(Does anybody know what this was all about? Talk to Jim.)

Mr. James B. Robins and family have moved into Snow Hill and are occupying the house he recently purchased on Federal Street. The house which was originally known as the Teagle Townsend property, and later as the George S. Richardson residence, is splendidly located, and is one of the most desirable properties in Snow Hill.
